## **Letter from Pastor Richard**

### **The Servant King**

There is a bit of a Coronation theme in this Newsletter. That is because very recently King Charles III was crowned at Westminster Abbey. It was an occasion full of pomp and ceremony, and the service was full of prayers for the new King and Queen. I really loved the music that was played and sung, and it was all done so well.



There are many things that could be said about the service and the day in general, but I would like to mention just one at this point. Early on, the King made a promise that he as king would serve not be served. That, in many ways, seems to stand in contrast to much of the pomp and ceremony that there was. And yet, it was a very important part of all that happened. In making that promise, the King was following in the footsteps of his mother the late Queen Elizabeth II. There was a monarch who served the country faithfully for the 70 years of her reign. And we trust that King Charles will continue as he fulfils the promise he has made. Elsewhere in the Newsletter I have written about how to pray for the King – see page 7.

But the promise to serve and not to be served is not new by any means. In fact, it goes right back to the time when the Lord Jesus Christ himself was on earth. While he was here, he said these words:

*For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many.” Mark 10 v 45 (NIV)*

The Lord Jesus Christ, the One who is God himself, the One who really could make everyone serve him, instead came to serve others. As we look at his life as recorded in the gospel accounts we see throughout how he put that into action, by spending time with those who others would ignore or shun. Most importantly of all, he came to serve by, as the verse tells us, giving his life. As perfect God, he never did anything wrong and

yet, he gave his life. Willingly he did that "as a ransom for many". A price needed to be paid for the wrong things that everyone on earth has done (everyone EXCEPT Jesus). But he was prepared to pay that price by giving up his life to death on a cross – there is no greater way that he could have served. And by that act of service, he made it possible for many – those who will put their trust in him – to know forgiveness for the wrong things that they have done. And that includes everyone who is reading this today. You can come to him, the King who came not to be served but to serve and give his life as a ransom.

*From heaven you came, helpless babe,  
entered our world, your glory veiled;  
not to be served but to serve,  
and give your life that we might live.*

*This is our God, the Servant King  
He calls us now to follow Him,  
to bring our lives as a daily offering,  
of worship to the Servant King.*

## **Doreen's Page: Enjoy the Sunshine!**

*The Summer has finally started with some lovely warm days – the perfect time to enjoy again this article from Doreen's book Fragrance of Faith:*

I read an account which identified that in the British Isles we need to take Vitamin D supplements to ensure a healthy old age! This is due to a lack of sunshine, and a widespread use of strong sun barrier creams. Advice was given to spend a short time each sunny day, in the sun, without sun creams. Children in particular need Vitamin D to protect them from developing rickets. I appreciate this reminder of the blessing and benefit of sunshine, with the balance of good advice so that we are not injured by an excess of sun.

There is a balance to maintain in most situations. One of the major benefits in our society is that we are taught to read – and there are plenty of things to read! We visited Hay-on-Wye and toured around the store which carries the title, 'The biggest second-hand book shop in the World!' It was an amazing experience, a real journey down memory lane on account of the generations of books on display and also a challenge to any reader thus confronted with all the books that are still there to be read. However, are books becoming outdated because we can now carry a complete library on our own mobile phone? Is this going to turn a town like Hay-on-Wye into a large literature museum?

There needs to be a balance here, between the facility provided by IT and the printed, published presentation of thought, word and deed available in a book. Surely discovering the expression of thought, word and deed in a book cannot be compared to releasing the same experience by the click of a button? It is rather like completely replacing summer sunshine with a tablet of Vitamin D; there needs to be a balance between the two options. Consider these words from the Bible:

*The Preacher sought to find words of delight, and uprightly he wrote words of truth.... The end of the matter, all has been heard. Fear God and keep his commandments, for this is the whole duty of man.'* (from Ecclesiastes 12: 10-12.)

There is an old adage which advises: The best book to read is the Bible!


The Coronation theme continued the following day, with Pastor Richard's sermon. See the 'Ask the Pastor' feature over the page for more information about why we should pray for King Charles.

## Ask the Pastor



Why does the Bible say  
we should pray  
for the King?

A number of people have been asking this question in the light of the coronation of King Charles III. To answer that question, I am going to share some extracts from a sermon I preached on Sunday 7 May, with a few additional thoughts. I took as my text 1 Timothy 2 v 1 – 6:

I urge, then, first of all, that petitions, prayers, intercession and thanksgiving be made for all people—for kings and all those in authority, that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness. This is good, and pleases God our Saviour, who wants all people to be saved and to come to a knowledge of the truth. For there is one God and one mediator between God and mankind, the man Christ Jesus, who gave himself as a ransom for all people. This has now been witnessed to at the proper time.

Now I realize that not everyone is in favour of the Royal Family – some people think that we should live in a republic without a hereditary head of state. However, I am not getting into that discussion here. What I would say is pray for King Charles even if you don't particularly like him or don't agree with some of the things that he has done and said. Paul was writing at the height of the Roman Empire - not a very godly regime at all! And so, if he can say pray for the Roman emperor, we should pray for our king.

Here are some reasons to pray for the King:



- Very simply, that is what pleases God (v3). In one sense we could stop there. That is the very best reason for anything we do.
- We want to *"live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness."* (v2). We should pray for him to govern in such a way that this happens.
- From that we can have freedom to be the church and proclaim the gospel of Jesus
- God wants *"people to be saved and come to a knowledge of the truth."* (v4) In fact, Paul goes into more detail about what that means in the next few verses:

*"For there is one God and one mediator between God and mankind, the man Christ Jesus, who gave himself as a ransom for all people."*

And the "all people" there includes King Charles III.

- The King made a number of promises in the coronation ceremony. He will not be able to keep them in his own strength. He needs God to enable him to do so.
- In particular, the King needs wisdom as he has promised to uphold the Christian faith and yet to do so in the context of a society which is made up of many faiths and none. The late Queen Elizabeth II did that extremely well. She was very upfront about her own Christian faith but carried out her responsibilities with sensitivity to others as well. Let's pray that our King follows her example.
- Finally, we can pray that as the King is enabled to do what he needs to, that will in turn point others to God as they see him at work in the life of Charles III.

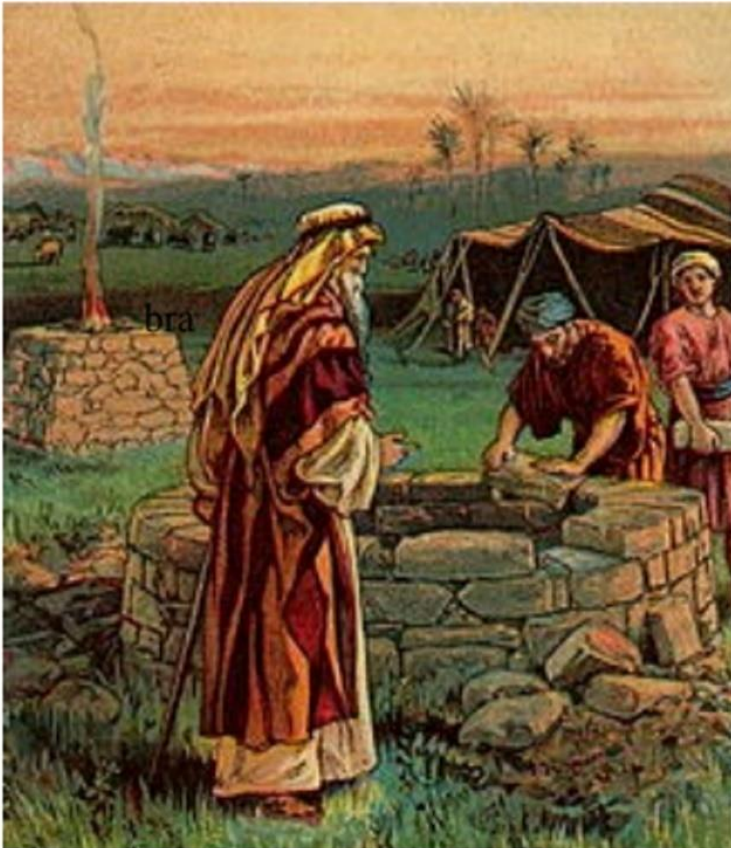
## Bible Notes (27)

### Wells, Springs and Cisterns

### Part one

Wells feature strongly in the Bible as an essential part of daily life. They provided water for washing, drinking, watering the flock and a meeting place; and to possess a well was to be independent.



To dig a new well was to show faith that God would bless you with a source of water. Isaac's servants (*Genesis 26:32*) came to him and told him about the well they had dug. "We've found water!" Isaac called the place Shibah and to this day, the Bible tells us, it is called Beersheba.

Abraham, Isaac's father, sent his servant back to his own country to find a

wife for his son and in *Genesis 24:3-67* there is a delightful account of how the faithful servant travelled back to Abraham's clan and stopped by the well and prayed, before he had finished Rebekah came out with a jar on her shoulder. She was very beautiful and went down to the spring. The servant hurried to meet her and said "Please give me a little water from your jar." The whole chapter is worth reading to see how God provided a wife for Isaac; for Abraham's faith; Rebekah's family and the God fearing servant entrusted with a vital mission for his master. The name Abraham means "Father of many".



Abraham was blessed that the Lord guided him to a *promised land* and to make it fertile, providing him with water. It was after his death that the Philistines stopped-up the wells by filling them with earth. Isaac reopened the wells (Genesis 26: 18) and named them as his father had done. Making a well is not easy; digging down to the water table may not yield results. Even today specialist are sought to find wells and the result could increase the value of a property

Nehemiah 9:25 and Deuteronomy 11 tell how Israel was give

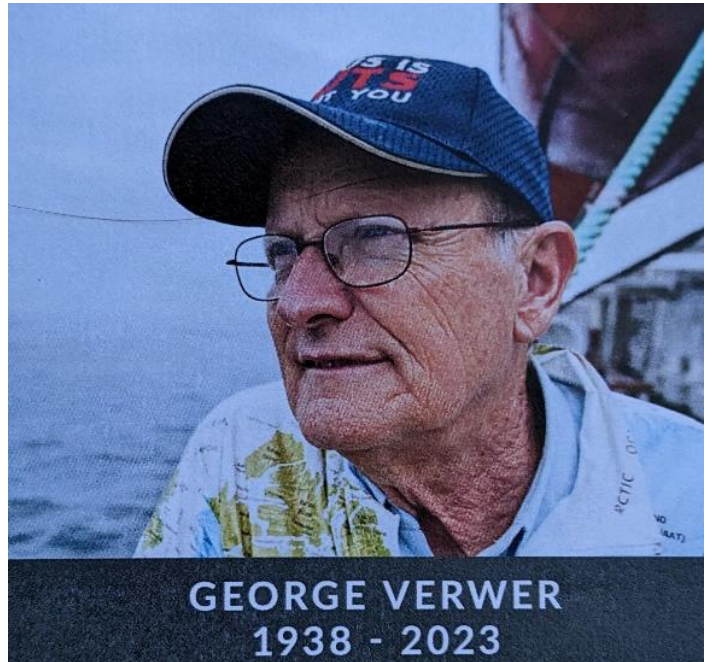


flourishing cities they did not build and houses filled with all kinds of good things and wells they did not dig!

Jacob followed his father in going east to Haran to find a wife from his family. He enquired from shepherds at a well, "Do you know Laban, Lahor's grandson?" They confirmed that they knew him and he was well and he asked why they were not watering their sheep and taking them back to pasture. "We can't," they replied, "until all the flocks are gathered and the stone has been rolled away from the mouth of the well." As they talked, Rachel came with her fathers, Laban's, sheep, for she was a shepherdess. When Jacob saw Rachel, daughter of Laban, he went and rolled away the stone from the mouth of the well and watered his uncle's sheep. Then Jacob kissed Rachael and began to weep aloud.

## The Life of George Verwer

On April 14, George Verwer, a dear friend of mine and brother in Christ, was promoted to glory. George was the founder of Operation Mobilisation, a powerful Christian organisation which helps followers of Jesus live out God's love all around the world, and I want to share with you this tribute to his life.



George was rarely seen without his 'world map' jacket and inflatable world globe. He had an extraordinary passion and vision for reaching the lost with the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ.

From his early days as a teenager, leading college mission trips to Mexico and with a vision for a ship to reach the World's nations – they are now on their 4<sup>th</sup> or 5<sup>th</sup> ship! – he inspired others to be involved in mission also. There are hundreds of mission organisations formed or led by those who have served on Operation Mobilisation.

George was a man of prayer, big-hearted and faithful at keeping in touch with the many who had been on OM, myself included. I will miss his letters, and packages of books and articles which he would send to encourage and challenge me.

I thank the Lord for the great blessing George has been to others worldwide and to myself, my late husband Graham, and my daughter Philippa.

He will be greatly missed. I am praying for his dear wife Drena and family, and for those who have worked closely with him for so many years. I would ask you to do the same.

## **FOCUS ON MISSION: Update from the Douglas Family**

*Helen and Angus Douglas, whose work with BMS World Mission we have followed and supported here at Upper Trosnant, are preparing to return permanently from Nepal to the UK. This is their latest letter:*

Dear friends and supporters,

Sending our love and greetings from warm and sunny Kathmandu, where spring has definitely arrived! Although rather brief here in Nepal, as summer heat (and mosquitos) quickly approach, spring is my favourite season. After the cold, dry, seeming deadness of winter, it is refreshing to see signs of new life appearing, with buds and flowers bursting forth. A time of hope and optimism for the future. We too have so many reasons to be thankful and hopeful for the future.

Earlier this month INF opened a new, long-awaited leprosy unit, the Eileen and Betty Unit at Green Pastures Hospital in Pokhara. This purpose-built, 30 bed ward is named in honour of INF pioneers Eileen Lodge and Betty Bailey. The facility is a space for multi-disciplinary treatment and care of people affected by leprosy across western Nepal, providing inpatient nursing care for approximately 300 patients each year. Patients diagnosed with leprosy in Nepal face stigma and discrimination which creates barriers to social inclusion and financial security. We pray that as patients are treated with compassion and dignity, they too will experience hope for the future.

Helen has been teaching medical and nursing staff at another leprosy hospital here in Kathmandu, Anandaban Hospital. This is a tertiary referral centre for complex patients, often with severe deformities or drug reactions. It also provides general medical, obstetric, paediatric, orthopaedic and trauma/emergency care for the surrounding area. It is really interesting how God has brought things full circle, as this was the first place Helen practiced as a GP in Nepal in 2013-15! Now at the end of 11 years here, it is really encouraging to see exciting developments and progress achieved, and to meet the fantastic staff, new and old, who have a real vision for serving the deprived community. It has been a privilege to help them develop and hone new skills.

In February we really enjoyed having Caleb to stay for 10 days and managed to get away together over the school break. Caleb is doing really well at Lee Abbey, gaining new skills, making new friends and growing in his faith. Since returning to the UK, he has visited Plymouth University and is now excited about what the next step of his journey will be. In our last newsletter we asked for you to pray for the logistics of packing up our life here and our move to the UK move. We have been so aware of God's faithfulness, kindness and provision to us in this season. He really has gone ahead and prepared the way with attention to even the smallest details. Through the generosity of friends, we have secured a house to rent in Selly Oak, Birmingham, near the former BMS mission college – an area that is familiar to the girls. Charis has been accepted to study in the sixth form she wanted. Next month we will have an official address to enable school applications for Esther and Qiniso. Here in Nepal, a new family has agreed to rent our house and buy almost all of the contents, which is such an answer to prayer as it means we can stay in our home here until the day we fly. So, whilst there is still much remaining to be organised, we are confident that God has every detail in hand, and we can trust His timing and perfect provision.

We are now, very much in the final stretch of our time here. Helen recently enjoyed a final short trek into the mountains. Watching the sunrise over the snowy Himalayan peaks and walking in the cold, fresh mountain air, surrounded by beautiful rhododendron blooms, was really special. It has been lovely to spend time with friends and colleagues, and we feel really blessed by the depth and richness of our relationships here. This does inevitably mean that it is more painful to say goodbye; tears have been shed over the last months and surely more will fall before we finally go. However, we are confident that this is the right time for us to leave as a family and we know God's peace and comfort even through those tears.

Thank you for your faithful prayer support over the last 11 years. Following on from our last requests, we are thrilled to say that all of the INF visas outstanding have now been granted. Please pray for peace during this transition, for patience and grace.

## **PRAYER PAGE**

Did you notice the Bible verse on the cover of the Newsletter? It is from the first chapter of a letter written by Paul to the members of the church at Corinth. The full sentence (1 Corinthians 1: 3-4) says:

Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of compassion and the God of all comfort, who comforts us in all our troubles, so that we can comfort those in any trouble with the comfort we ourselves receive from God.

Paul knew a lot about troubles! Just have a look at 2 Corinthians 11: 23-8. He was beaten up, flogged, stoned, mocked, shipwrecked (3 times) and often felt weak from hunger and exhaustion. But he knew just as much about the comfort of God – and his letters are full of praise. As we consider the troubles of our own world, which are many, let us too rejoice in the comfort that God gives us – by his love and forgiveness, through the Holy Spirit, from his Word in the Bible, and through our knowledge of his love and forgiveness, and the hope of eternal life in heaven.

There are so many people and situations in need of God's comfort today. Let us thank God for all that he has done and is doing for us as we pray for or share his comfort directly with others.

- Pray for peace in Ukraine and in Sudan: ask God to comfort the homeless, the bereaved, the soldiers, their families, the children, and the churches.
- Pray for countries devastated by droughts, famines, and floods, including Sudan and Italy; lift up the starving, the destitute, the despairing and the homeless.
- Pray for our nation, for those struggling with loneliness, or against the cost of living, or who are waiting to get the medical treatment they need. Pray for all Christians and churches, that God will use them to comfort and their local communities.
- Pray for Christians Against Poverty as they seek to bring comfort through debt relief. Lift up those working in the head office, and for Simon Matheson here in Torfaen. Pray too for the Food Bank. Remember our missionary friends: Margaret and Roy Collins-Reece in Toulouse; David and Sue Verwey in Japan; and Angus and Helen Douglas in Nepal.
