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

Letter from Pastor Richard Always an Encouragement

I first met Doreen Harrison in 2015 when I came to preach at Trosnant. And there is always one word that I associate with her – encouragement. After a service or meeting she would regularly say, "That was good!" I knew that she was not saying that in order to flatter my ego. Doreen Harrison considered anything good that pointed to the Lord Jesus Christ.



She truly was a joy to speak to. I have to say, I always felt better after seeing her. Her

words were always full of love and concern, and a desire to encourage me in ministry. Doreen has been a great support to Annmarie and me since we have been here at Trosnant. Her knowledge of Pontypool was great; she got to know the area well having moved here in 1996. And Doreen was well aware of the Christian scene – she knew all of the churches in the valley and regularly prayed for them. She was concerned that Christians from different churches should meet together and was instrumental in setting up a monthly Ladies Prayer Retreat.

Which brings me to another encouragement – her prayers. She regularly attended our midweek Bible Studies and Prayer Meetings, and when she prayed, we felt that she was taking us into the very throne room of Heaven. If Doreen said that she would pray for you, you knew that you were in safe hands.

Those prayers came from the deep relationship she had with the Lord. She came to faith at the age of 18 on a Palm Sunday and walked with the Lord for the next 72 years. Eternity alone will tell of the number of lives her words and prayers impacted.

Doreen was also very involved in church life at Upper Trosnant. She had a very active role in Sisterhood for many years, she attended many of the other meetings of the church and always made a positive contribution. She would often bring insights into Bible Studies that others

would not see. I remember when we looked at the Parable of the Pharisee and Tax Collector, only Doreen could say "The poor Pharisee..."

We always enjoyed her articles in this Newsletter too; until recently she produced a new piece each month, always topical and relevant. She has also written a number of books, again full of wisdom and encouragement. Doreen was a great encourager of people on a one-to-one basis. I know that many of you reading this have benefitted from her counsel, and her ability to look at a situation and see a positive way forward. As I have already said, Doreen encouraged me greatly in many ways; the knowledge that she was praying for me was such a strength in ministry.

There is so much that could be written, and indeed has been written even in this Newsletter. The contributions show the love and esteem so many had for her. We continue to remember Richard and the rest of the family, that they will know the loving arms of the Lord around them at this time. Even though we grieve, we know that she is with the Lord who she loves so much. I read this verse at Doreen's Thanksgiving Service:

"You will receive a rich welcome into the everlasting kingdom of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. (2 Peter 1 v 1 - 12)

And I wanted to quote a favourite hymn of Doreen, which is not easy because she had so many. But I know she liked this one, and as we have just celebrated Easter this is appropriate:

Thine be the glory, risen conquering Son.
Endless is the Victory, Thou o'er death hast won!

Be encouraged by those words, as you remember the encouragement that Doreen gave.

A Long Life of Love and Service

thanksgiving service The Doreen's life could not be held at Upper Trosnant: the church was too small to fit everyone in who wanted to come. The large congregation that gathered instead at Park Street Chapel in Blaenavon on the morning of 18 April was testament to how just many lives Doreen had touched in her 89 years, and how much she meant to so many people. She may have been small in stature but she was mighty in spirit, and in partnership with her husband Richard, she was a truly powerful woman of God.



Doreen was born in Huddersfield, West Yorkshire, on 13 April 1934. She attended primary school in Crosshills and the Girls' Grammar School at Keighley, where her father worked in the textile industry. An only child, and very close to her father, she loved to go cycling with him in the Yorkshire Dales. Doreen developed a great love for the natural world which stayed with her all her life. Sadly, her father died when she was only 15, and it was a difficult time. She and her mother returned to Huddersfield, where Doreen determined to avoid the traditional life of working in the mills. She worked hard at school, and won a place at teacher training college, helping pay her way with jobs at a pharmacy and at Woolworth's, and later as an auxiliary nurse in the holidays.

You can read Doreen's own account of how she came to know the Lord on page 9 of this Newsletter. She was 18, and attended a service on Palm Sunday 1953. There was a notable preacher in the pulpit, but it was not his words that converted her; rather, a nameless person at the end of the service, who told her that if she became a Christian, she would never feel lonely again. Doreen threw herself into following Jesus with characteristically wholehearted enthusiasm. Soon she was preaching on the local Methodist circuit. She had a natural gift for story-telling and in

the summer months joined first with a local preacher and then with the Salvation Army to share stories of Jesus at a beach mission at Whitley Bay.

Richard remembers vividly the first time that he met Doreen. It was "in my sister's farmhouse in Folly Gill. Youth 'squashes' were held every Sunday evening. I was seated halfway up the stairs when in walked a lady in a navy-blue costume, wearing a hat with feathers the rich colour of a pheasant." Richard was working on his father's farm in the Yorkshire Dales, and Doreen had just been appointed as headteacher of Lofthouse Primary School and was travelling to work by bus from lodgings in Glasshouses. Aged 24, she was the youngest Head in England. When the interviewing panel asked how she would manage, she replied that she would, because she was relying on a power greater than herself. In later life she would tell the story of how she had opened a newspaper to a page of teaching posts, closed her eyes and asked the Lord to guide her finger to the right one. Doreen loved teaching, and, because she looked for, and brought out, the best in every child in every class, she was loved in return by her pupils and their parents.

Doreen and Richard were married on 20 September 1960 and set up home in a caravan. Together they felt called to God's service, and Doreen's strong faith helped give Richard the courage to leave the family farm and follow their vocation. One of the few training colleges that accepted married couples was run by the Salvation Army at Denmark Hill in South London, and here they arrived in August 1961, two of the first ever married cadets, and Doreen the very first to be pregnant. The training was demanding but they had many wonderful experiences in worship and on placement in West Croydon, walking there on thick ice in the bad winter of 1963. Doreen returned to Yorkshire for the birth of Rachel on 2 March, and was commissioned as a Salvation Army officer with Richard two months later. For two years they were stationed at Bromley in Kent. But Doreen was struggling with her health, having experienced toxaemia in pregnancy. Ruth was born in 1964, and the responsibilities of Salvation Army leadership were considerable. After much prayer, she and Richard knew it was right to leave, which they did on good terms. became a probation officer and Doreen a doctor's receptionist and

cleaner. They were baptized at Allerford Chapel in Beckenham, before moving to Wainscott near Rochester where they lived with 'Little Granny' – Doreen's mother, who was even more petite than her daughter. Here they joined first a brethren chapel, and then, when rules around praying seemed too restrictive, the Baptist Church. Doreen returned to teaching, only retiring, reluctantly, in 1984, when her arthritis made the work too difficult.

Richard was now pastor of Bishop's Stortford Baptist Church, and Doreen was fully involved in church life and as a counsellor. Their final move together was to Pontypool in 1996, when Richard was called to be the Eastern Valley Missioner, working with five local Baptist Churches, including Upper Trosnant, where they came into membership on his 'retirement'. Doreen developed her counselling ministry, training under Selwyn Hughes, and also her writing. As the anonymous author of 'Icthus' in the Free Press, she never missed a week for over 20 years. Meanwhile, she started the Ladies Prayer Retreat, fostering lasting friendships between the women of many local congregations. Doreen was much in demand as a local preacher and speaker at meetings, and for her schools' ministry. It was a great joy to both Doreen and Richard to become grandparents, and they took great delight and pride in Ruth and her husband Jason's three children, Max, Rachel and Lottie, all of whom are today following the Lord and working in various roles in health care.

Doreen never complained about her health; rather, she prayed that she would always have sight to read the Bible, and a voice to speak about the Lord. In 2018 she suffered a stroke which had a lasting effect, and in the final year of her life she grew increasingly dependent on carers. God gave her the grace to accept the help that she needed, and God's love streamed from her to all whom she met. As Richard recalled, when out and about with Doreen in the wheelchair, 'Many times coming towards us was a complete stranger smiling broadly, obviously influenced by the smiles emanating from the one entrusted to my care.'

Doreen died very peacefully at home with her family on 25 March. Following the service at Blaenavon, she was laid to rest the next day in a beautiful country churchyard at Dacre, in the Yorkshire Dales. We can praise God that her soul now rejoices with her Lord in Heaven.

Doreen the Writer

For many years, Doreen has been a much-loved member of our church here at Upper Trosnant and will never be forgotten for the way in which she radiated faith and trust in the Lord. As well as being a wife, mother and grandmother, she found time to speak at meetings, lead services, run prayer retreats, paint pictures, and write at least 12 books which were sent, sold, read and loved by people all around the world! Our church library in the Hall has copies of several of her books, and they are worth borrowing and reading if you haven't already done so.



Doreen's first book went to print back in 2010, under the title "Just a Thought in Passing...." and is a collection of short stories based on her *Icthus* articles for the local *Free Press*. It was created to mark 50 years of her marriage to Richard, and opens with a lovely introduction and photograph of the two of them in their golden anniversary year. The 40 short stories that follow are drawn from an abundance of Doreen's memories, experiences and interests, all of which she relates to her faith in order to help us to look at our lives and experiences through the same lens of faith and trust and joy in God.

This first book was followed by at least three more, all written in a similar style. They are illustrated with beautiful watercolour paintings and line drawings by

Jill Fryer, and have titles that make you smile such as "Coping with the Wobbles of Life" and "A Baker's Dozen from the Bread of Life".

Around the same time, Doreen wrote two books for children that have been enjoyed by children and adults alike. One of these is "The Donkey Boy" which tells the story of a donkey and his young master, Ben, and his life-changing encounters with Jesus. The second book is "Jubilant Jeremy Johnson" and is about a young boy who seems, at first, to have no talents - until he meets Jesus.

From 2019 - 2021, Doreen collaborated with Mathew Bartlett, the minister of Sharon Church in Pontypool, to create a series of at least six more books, all beautifully produced and full of colour photographs that accompany each story. The format is similar to her earlier books, and the stories are full of interest, variety, humour, warmth, colour, encouragement and faith. The titles are all based on one of the loves of her life - flowers - and include "A Bouquet of Blessings", "A Garland of Grace", "Fragrance of Faith", "Daffodils in Winter" and "A Benediction of Bluebells". With just over thirty stories in each book, the reader can enjoy daily encouragement and inspiration for a whole month, and more!



Doreen's final book - "Wildflowers of Joy" - is a little shorter than the others and was published during the difficult time of the Covid lockdowns. In this beautiful little book, Doreen especially encourages her readers to focus on all the glories of God's creation - the flowers with their beauty and scent and colour, the trees, the honeybees, seedtime and harvest, snow in winter, and the glory of the rainbow that reminds us of the faithfulness of our God in keeping all His good promises whatever we may be going through. What a fitting conclusion this book is to Doreen's writing ministry that has brought hope, smiles, reassurance and faith to so many people.

from Coping with the Wobbles of Life

When I was growing up in the industrial North of England, little girls had two ambitions. The first was to be chosen for the chorus line of small sunbeams in the Christmas pantomime at the Alhambra Theatre, Bradford, and the second was to sing in the Huddersfield Choral Society. I never achieved either of these ambitions!

However, I have been in the chorus line of Heavenly Sunbeams for 50 years now, and one day I will be part of a choir which exceeds, in size and quality, any human choir ever assembled. This choir is described in the Bible with these words:

"I heard every creature in heaven and on earth and under the earth and on the sea and all that is in them singing, To Him who sits on the throne and to the Lamb, be praise and honour and glory and power for ever and ever."

I became a Christian when I was at teacher training college. I went to hear a Welsh Preacher by the name of Maynard James. He had glory in his words, but it was not the power of rhetoric which gave me a longing to become part of the family of God. Someone said to me, at the close of the service, "If you become a Christian, you will never be lonely again," and this was the word I needed to hear. So, I joined the chorus line, and I have had a song in my soul ever since. Christians belong to the greatest fellowship on earth. We belong to the family of God. Nothing can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

The Huddersfield Choral Society became famous because of the clarity of its diction. This happened because most of the choristers worked in woollen mills and had learned to speak clearly above the noise of the looms. To sing in the heavenly choir, it is necessary to be able to speak above the clamour of society today and identify the language of Heaven.

And now, Hallelujah! The rest of my days
Shall gladly be spent in promoting his praise,
Who opened his bosom to pour out this sea
Of boundless salvation for you and for me.

Doreen was born on the 13th April and in the same year Richard Briers, of the *Good Life*, Roy Kinnear, TV comedian, Judi Dench and Maggie Smith, both actresses, put in an appearance. *Swallow and Amazons* by Arthur Ransom was reprinted three times.

Prime Minister was Ramsay
MacDonald, Franklin D. Roosevelt
was U.S. President, George V was
King of England and Donald Duck
was introduced in *The Wise Little*Hen.

Meccano produced Dinky Toys. Cat's eyes were patented as a road safety feature and Queen Mary was launched at Clydebank.

Evangeline Booth, 4th daughter of Salvation Army founders, William and Catherine Booth, became General from 1934-39. Previously, at 21, she had commanded Marylebone Corps and been Commander in Canada 1896-1904 and then Commander in USA from 1904-34.

In this year, William (Billy) Franklin Graham, was converted at a Christian rally in Charlotte, North Carolina under the preaching of Albert McMakin. Considered as one of the most influential of Christian leaders Billy Graham preached for six decades as a Baptist Minister to over 210 million people in 185 countries. It is estimated that 3.2 million people responded to the invitation, "to accept Jesus Christ as their personal Savior"

In Germany the Confessing Church divided, in this year, from the main German Evangelical Church which was pro-Nazi. Led by such men as Dietrich Bonhoeffer, an international German theologian and anti-Nazis, the Confessing Church was persecuted.

So, the delightfully smiling Doreen was born into a world of turmoil. The Germans covertly preparing for war and western economies recovering from the great depression.
