

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

<u>Letter from Pastor Richard</u> <u>Serving Together</u>

CIO Update

During May, Christian Williams from the Baptist Union of Wales came to a Church Members' Meeting and presented a new draft constitution for Upper Trosnant to adopt when we become a Charitable Incorporated Organisation.

The new constitution is a comprehensive document in a legal format and language which is acceptable to the Charity Commission. At a subsequent Church Meeting in June, we voted to adopt this constitution. Very soon, the Church's trust deeds will be looked after by the Baptist Union of Wales, meaning we will no longer have local building trustees.

Over the coming months, I will be writing some articles for the Newsletter to explain the implications of these changes for us as a church as we go forward together.

Doreen's Page: Lying Down in Green Pastures

As dry weather is replaced by summer showers and storms, we can really appreciate these wise words from Doreen's book, A Bouquet of Blessings.

When I was teaching, I remember one hot June morning, during a prolonged drought, when a small boy waved his reading book at me and said, 'Miss, this book tells lies. It says, grass is green, but it isn't!' He pointed at the school field which was withered and yellow in the heat. Green is a refreshing colour that sometimes gets a bad press; we say people are "green with envy", or we tell someone "Don't be so green", implying they are rather simple. Yet green is an energetic colour, it is the sign of living action and movement in nature, and just like the traffic light of the same colour, its appearance in Spring tells us to get moving. Green is the colour of growth; after the Spring rains how green our valleys look! On the other hand, some people I know think green is an unlucky colour, and for that reason they will not wear it.

Green is a restful colour too; my eyesight is blessed to see a green landscape. The Bible uses the colour green to describe peace and contentment. Psalm 23 begins,

'The Lord is my shepherd, I lack nothing. He makes me lie down in green pastures.'

After recent rains we will soon be surrounded by an abundance of green growth. Psalm 23 picks up this thought, as it continues,

'He leads me beside quiet waters, he refreshes my soul.'

We live in a colourful world. God did not create a black and white landscape; he created it to be colourful for our pleasure. In the days of Noah, after the great Flood, in order to reassure the family as they came out of the Ark, God arched a rainbow over them and said:

'I have set my rainbow in the clouds, and it will be the sign of the covenant between me and the earth.'

As I enjoy the abundance of greenery in our valley – shades of lime green, emerald, turquoise, mint, sea green, dark, light and fresh and all of them so lovely – I am sure that the Bible is certainly a book which doesn't tell lies. It contains the truth about the God who loves us with an everlasting love; and who displays that love around us so we may know him.

Part Two

John 4:5 So Jesus came to a town in Samaria called Sychar near a plot of ground Jacob had given to his son Joseph; Jabob's well was there, and Jesus tired from his journey, about the sixth hour, when a Samaritan woman came to draw water. Jesus said, "Will you give me a drink?" She was aware that he was a Jew and did not associate with Samaritans, but Jesus lifts the conversation to a higher level and goes on to tell her about the water, "welling up to eternal life". Wells were a great

meeting place and almost a marriage bureau; Isaac, Jacob and Moses all met their wives at wells. The women came at about the sixth hour with their jars to collect water for their house-holds and the flocks depended on being watered. The wells usually had some sort of guard or stone to stop animals falling in, Under Mosaic law (Exodus 21:33) there was a penalty for the well owner if an animal fell into his well.

Jacob's well is located at Balata Village, south east of the city of Nablus about 49Km north of Jerusalem in the crypt of the Greek Orthodux Church. It is still possible to drink from the well which has had the same custodian, a priest, for the last forty

Moses (Exodus 17:4) said "Why do you quarrel with me?", when the ever complaining Israelites said "Give us water to drink". They said, "Why did you bring us up out of Egypt to make us and our children and livestock die of thirst?". Moses cried out to the Lord and the Lord answered Moses, "Walk on ahead of the people. Take with you some of the Elders of Israel and in your hand the staff which you struck the Nile, and go. The Lord said, I will stand there before you by the rock at Horeb. Strike the rock and water will come out of it". Who would know that here was a hidden water cistern, but the Lord did.

Focus on Mission: Update from Dale and Naomi

Naomi and I would like to give you an update from the last year. As of this moment I have completed all six of my Masters degree essays over the course of two years. They have been really thought provoking and helped me engage with lots of theology and practice. The topics include: The second coming, hermeneutics and Anti-war, the Psalms, feminist theology, missiology and analysing the claims that Matthew's gospel is an antisemitic text.



My placement at Mount Pleasant Baptist Church in Blackwood has been going really well and it has given me lots of opportunities for preaching and leading. They have had a new minister named Andy Baker while Mark Thomas is moving on to another church.

I have been learning Welsh for the last 6 years and on Pentecost I had my first opportunity to preach in Welsh. I am really praying that the Lord will use this for ministry later in the future. I am open to serving in a Welsh speaking church.

As of May I have increased my hours working at Crickhowell from 16 to 30 hours. I now work 4 days a week Monday till Thursday. If I am not at Mount Pleasant I am usually speaking as a lay preacher around the Valleys most Sundays.

Also, we wanted to inform you all that Naomi has officially retired from Covenant Players after 21 years of service so she can best support and care for Felicity. As a family we are praying how to best care for Felicity while maintaining ministry and part time work. We are not sure how things will look in the near the future, but we trust the Lord for these things.

We are still looking for a new home and we are praying for something close to Felicity's school. However, I am happy to travel in order to do ministry. July will be the last college week for this year and then we will restart in September 2023. We would like to thank you all for your prayers and support over the years.

<u>Have you ever wondered – why is the Bible called the Bible?</u>

The term 'Bible' is used both for the Hebrew Bible, which we would call the Old Testament, and for the Christian Bible, which also contains the New Testament. Our English word Bible is derived from the Greek $\tau \dot{a}$ $\beta_1 \beta_2 \lambda \dot{a}$ (ta biblia), which means 'the books'. Originally the literal meaning was 'the scrolls', as texts would be written on long sheets of papyrus and rolled up around a stick to keep them safe. Papyrus is an aquatic flowering plant that grows in North Africa, forming tall clumps of reed-like vegetation in shallow water. Its pith was first used by the ancient Egyptians as a writing surface, and the Greeks called it by the name of the ancient city and seaport Byblos, situated on the coast of Lebanon, from where it was exported to Greece by ship across the Mediterranean.

The first person to refer to the sacred texts of the Old and New Testaments as *ta biblia* is thought to be John Chrysostom in his sermons *Homilies on Matthew*, written between 386 and 388 AD. John was born in Antioch in Turkey in the year 347 and baptised there as a young man. He trained as a lawyer but grew more and more deeply committed to Christianity and turned to the study of theology, becoming well known as a preacher and teacher. He became a hermit and devoted himself to committing the whole Bible to memory. In 397 he was appointed Archbishop of Constantinople but was later was exiled and died in 407. He is venerated by many churches today as a Saint.

Upper Trosnant Update

- We have recently celebrated Pentecost Sunday, when we read of the Holy Spirit coming in great power upon the first disciples. And his coming made a big difference to their lives – they went from being fearful to full of faith and were able to take the message of the Gospel out. We know that he is with us as we meet, and we pray that his power will be clear for us to see and experience.

Supplication
