A Letter from our Moderator...

Hebrews 13:8 – "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and for ever."

2026 marks a significant anniversary for the fellowship at Trosnant, for 250 years ago a group of Baptist Christians formed a worshipping community here in Pontypool, the Christian community pre-dating the building in which we now worship. A people of God covenanting together to worship and serve their Saviour, the Lord Jesus Christ. Although life back then was very different, the transformation that belief in Jesus makes to each one of us remains the same.

Hebrews 13 verse 8, which is quoted above, stresses this enduring principle of the unchanging nature of Jesus Christ. The truth is that God loves us and has shown His love in the person and work of the Lord Jesus Christ, and Jesus' living Spirit is available to prompt us to come to Him and to empower us in our daily living.

Jesus has been present with the congregation as it met in 1776; He is with us in 2026; and will be with us until God calls us to glory or Jesus comes again in all of His glory. In the meantime, we must worship and witness for Jesus in every way possible.

It is suggested that the celebration of this important milestone in the life of Trosnant will take place throughout the year. Each activity organised by the fellowship will participate in recognising, not only God's goodness through the years, but also the importance of the Gospel message for today's attenders. There are many activities which take place in the life of the fellowship at Trosnant, as well as our Sunday opportunities to fellowship with others. Each month, we will take time in one or other of the activities to give thanks for the past, and trust ourselves to all that God has for us in the present and the future.

This important verse from Hebrews 13 about the nature of Jesus Christ comes in a chapter that has much practical advice for us as followers of Jesus. There must be love among believers as we welcome "strangers" into the Christian community, where we show "hospitality" to those who come. We must learn contentment over covetousness, and remember what God says, "Never will I leave you; never will I forsake you, " for "The

Lord is my helper; I will not be afraid." We must "be strengthened by grace" as we follow Jesus, and in that way we will be able to "continually offer a sacrifice of praise." Prayer must be at the heart of our worship and witness. By being obedient in these ways, we will know God's blessing: "Now may the God of peace, who through the blood of the eternal covenant brought back from the dead our Lord Jesus, that great Shepherd of the sheep, equip you with everything good for doing His will, and may He work in us what is pleasing to Him, through Jesus Christ, to whom be glory for ever and ever. Amen." (Hebrews 13:20-21)

In your **relationships** with one another, have the same **mindset** as **Christ Jesus**: Who, being in very **nature God**, did not **consider equality** with God **something** to be **used** to his **own advantage**; **rather**, he made **himself nothing** by taking the very nature of a **servant**, being made in **human** likeness. And being **found** in **appearance** as a **man**, he **humbled** himself by becoming **obedient** to death — even **death** on a **cross!** Therefore God **exalted** him to the highest **place** and gave him the **name** that is **above** every name, that at the name of Jesus every **knee** should **bow**, in **heaven** and on earth and under the earth, and every **tongue acknowledge** that Jesus Christ is **Lord**, to the **glory** of God the **Father**. (Philippians 2: 5-11)

Upper Trosnant: Why and When?

It's no mean task condensing 250 years of history into two pages! History isn't everyone's cup of tea, but it matters. For history is a set of stepping stones taking us back into the past, connecting us with people, places and events. That connection gives us meaning. Being connected is good for our wellbeing. And history is all around us: 'The past clings to us' as someone once said. In Deuteronomy the Israelites were urged to 'Remember the days of old; consider the generations long past'. The Israelites were encouraged to learn from their history; their past was part of their identity, and it strengthened their faith in God.

Here at Trosnant then, there is every good reason for knowing our own history. It is part of our identity. So here are the bare bones...

In June 1894, Jane Powell died aged 76. She was described in the Free Press as one of the oldest and most respected inhabitants of Pontypool. More than this, she was the oldest member of Upper Trosnant Baptist Church, having been received into fellowship 60 years earlier. This takes us back to 1834, to almost within touching distance of the first generation of members of this church that was established in 1776. Jane's husband Henry, who survived her, was for many years senior deacon of the church and its secretary. The Powells lived at 50 Albion Road. The 1891 Census records Henry as aged 77 and an unemployed collier. These days he would be entitled to declare that he was deservedly 'retired'! Jane Powell was buried in Upper Trosnant's churchyard. The Census records many industrial workers living in Albion Road in 1891. Albion Road itself was established in 1820. It was part of the improvements to the road network that were needed by the industrial and urban developments that were well underway by this date. The road linked Old Furnace to Trosnant. In other words – Upper Trosnant church was in the midst of an industrial community.

This takes us back to my title: why is Upper Trosnant church here? In short, the answer is industry. The area was rich in natural resources needed for iron production. Charcoal, coal and iron ore were available in abundance, and the Afon Lwyd river and its tributaries provided waterpower. It was the exploitation of these natural resources by enterprising individuals that triggered the industrial boom in the area.

Pontypool can thus claim to be the earliest industrial town in Wales. In fact, industry in the area can be traced back centuries before the town came into being.

The early members of Trosnant Church were predominantly workers seeking to make a living in this growing industrial district. The siting of a church here may also have been a deliberate attempt to bring the word of God to an industrial settlement. It was during the early 1770s that a group broke away from the Baptist chapel at Penygarn. They were led by Miles Edwards, and met at his house at the Wern. The separatists enjoyed rapid success and in 1776 were constituted into a self-supporting church. Miles Edwards became its first minister. By now Miles Edward's house was too small and a house at Upper Trosnant was purchased and opened as a church in May 1779. Upper Trosnant had begun.

The church continued to flourish in the time of William Edmunds who succeeded Edwards in 1808. In 1814 a Sunday School was established –

possibly the first in the area. Then in 1820 а new meeting house was built on the site of the present building. It was opened in the time of Trosnant's third minister David Roberts. After eight vears stormy which he stirred up the town with his preaching, fiery Roberts made way for the much quieter John Williams.

It was during John Williams' flourishing ministry that the 16-year-old Jane Powell had become a member. Jane Powell died of a painful illness aged 76. By this time Henry her husband was 81. One of the remarkable things about the couple is that they were still living together at home – how did they avoid having to enter the dreaded workhouse where they faced being separated? Presumably they were bolstered by their faith, and sustained by their family, their Christian friends and the Upper Trosnant church community.

Life was hard for the likes of the Powells as it can be at times for most of us but we can draw strength, as I'm sure the Powells did, from the words of Jesus recorded in John's gospel:

Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid. John 14:27.

The 20th century saw several short pastorates and periods of vacancy, an indication of decline that Trosnant shared with many churches. The closure of the Sunday School in 1991 was one of the saddest landmarks in the church's history.

But Trosnant has deep roots and there were signs of resilience and optimism. In 1995 the church supported the calling of an Eastern Valley Missioner to support smaller churches in the valley. The Missioner appointed was Richard Harrison, and he came with his wife Doreen. In 1997 the Eastern Valley Christian Men's Fellowship was formed while the Sisterhood, established just after the Second World War, continued to meet.

A sure sign of faith and vigour was the calling of Richard Miles to the pastorate in 2014. After a 25-year interregnum Upper Trosnant once more had a minister at the helm (and not forgetting Annmarie his wife). There was a mixture of sadness but also gratitude for their nine-years of service when the couple left for pastures new in 2024, but Trosnant's light remained undimmed. This the 'Church Profile', ready to be shown to potential new pastors, attests.

We are a church with a future as well as a past.

This is the latest news from Cambodia, where, through BMS World Mission, we partner with Pastor J in Phnom Penh.

Warm greetings in the name of Jesus. The past two months have been overflowing with the marvellous works of God. We have witnessed God's kindness and power, with prayers answered in ways that brought us deep joy. Each moment has reminded us of God's faithfulness and the strength of His people working together. Your prayers have truly accomplished great things. The months of October and November 2025 have truly been a season of extraordinary blessing. We have seen the Gospel take root in villages, families, and hearts – each testimony reminding us of the Lord's faithfulness.

7 October – Evangelists' Monthly Gathering at Horaios Baptist Church. Despite logistical challenges, over twenty evangelists came together for fellowship, encouragement, and training. During this gathering, Bunthoen from Svaysor was baptized, reminding us that even one soul is precious in God's sight.

8 November – Baptisms in Khnaik Kontut & Tropeang Pek. After a week of faithful prayer and bold witness, twelve new believers publicly declared their faith in Christ. Three from Khnaik Kontut and nine from Tropeang Pek entered the waters of baptism. This day was filled with joy.

15-16 November – Outreach in Angkrolanh Village. Partnering with Pastor Phen, missionaries and local evangelists gathered more than twenty-three people for sharing the gospel, counselling, and prayer. The outreach extended beyond the church walls, with home visits to six households. The very next day, 16th November, ten new believers were baptized – a powerful testimony of how the Spirit moves when God's Word is proclaimed.

Fruit of the Season. In total, 23 new believers were baptized during these two months. Each baptism is not just a number, but a life transformed, a family touched, and a community impacted. Your prayers strengthen our faith and remind us that the Gospel continues to advance, one heart at a time.

Horaios Baptist Church Thanksgiving Sunday. On October 26, we rejoiced together in marking the tenth Anniversary of Horaios Baptist Church. Members brought fruits and home-cooked dishes, and after worship we enjoyed a warm fellowship meal. With grateful hearts, we gave thanks for God's faithfulness, His unfailing love, and His gracious presence throughout this journey. Truly, all glory and praise belong to Him for these ten blessed years.

Certificate Dedication Ceremony. On 14th October at Svaysor Baptist Church, Svaysor Village, Battambang, a Certificate Dedication Ceremony was held for 54 participants who completed the course 'A Must-Know for Christian Leaders.' This programme comprises eleven foundational lessons covering key doctrinal themes and reflections on the biblical concept of Christian church leadership.

Children Meet 2025. On October 12, nearly 100 children gathered at Horaios Baptist Church for the third Children's Meet. With the theme 'Army of Jesus Christ' (2 Timothy 2:3), the day was filled with joyful presentations, games, food, gifts, and fellowship. We praise God for the teachers who faithfully nurture these young ones. Indeed, they are being raised as soldiers of Christ, equipped to stand firm in faith.

Contextual Church Planting Discussion & Baptism Testimony.

On October 7th, more than 20 people attended the monthly meeting and training. We engaged in a lively and meaningful discussion on a key contextual issue in church planting: how to approach funeral traditions within the Cambodian cultural framework, exploring how Christians might respond to the tenth-day death anniversary observance and honour traditional practices in a biblically faithful way. The conversation was both intense and thought-provoking.

Thank you for standing with us in faith and prayer. Your love and support strengthen us daily as we share Christ's light in Cambodia. We give thanks to God for His faithfulness, and to you for your prayers and support in this mission. **Psalm 126:3 – "The Lord has done great things for us, and we are filled with joy."**

Life is coming again to our Valley!

This year is the 20th anniversary of the Life Exhibition, and I am delighted to share the good news that, for two weeks, **Monday 9th to Friday 20th March**, it is coming once again to Pontypool. Life is a multi-media experience that is produced by Counties Evangelism. It is especially designed to introduce primary school children to the life of Jesus, and it works alongside the existing RE syllabus in Years 5 and 6 – that is, children aged 10 and 11.

What happens at Life? The children and their teachers come by bus to Pontymoile Mission, where the exhibition is held. Each class is divided into three groups who visit three zones or "pods" in turn. Each pod concentrates on one aspect of Jesus's life: the Timeline of prophesies and their fulfillment; his 'works', that is, his miracles; and his 'words', ie what he taught in the parables. In the pods, each child has a tablet device which shows them questions, videos and music. Next the children see a short film about Jesus's death and resurrection. Here the children are encouraged to think carefully about what happened. The exhibition ends in the 'café', where the children have refreshments while taking part in an interactive quiz to see how much they have learned.

Can I see the exhibition too? Yes! There is a special opening for churches on the evening of **Friday 19**th **March**.

What can I do to help? Please pray for the preparations now being made by our team of volunteers. Thank the Lord that many local schools have already booked their slots to visit, and pray that the few remaining sessions will be taken by additional schools from the North of Torfaen. Many hundreds of children and their teachers will hear the Gospel during Life. Ask the Lord that every single seed sown will bear fruit.

Help is needed in practical ways too. Could you help run the café, preparing and serving refreshments to the children, and cleaning up after each group? Volunteers also introduce the topics in the pods. If you would like to know more about this role – training is given – please do speak to me. And finally, Life costs £5,500 to run, including free transport for all the schools, and about one third of this sum remains to be raised. Any gifts, however small, will be gratefully received.

PRAYER PAGE: The Battle belongs to the Lord!

What can we expect from Upper Trosnant's 250th anniversary year? Some wonderful times of celebration and fellowship, surely. Some great answers to prayer, certainly. But also, there will be times of struggle, difficulty, and trouble. The Bible tells us that 'Your enemy the devil prowls around like a roaring lion looking for someone to devour.' (1 Peter 5:8). Paul's life was one of 'fighting the good fight' against persecution, hardship, misunderstandings, and all the evils of the world –

– which was exactly why he preached what he practised! Paul wrote from prison to the church at Ephesus, 'Therefore put on the full armour of God... Stand firm with the belt of truth buckled around your waist, with the breastplate of righteousness in place, and with your feet fitted with the readiness that comes from the gospel of peace. In addition to all this, take up the shield of faith, with which you can extinguish all the flaming arrows of the evil one. Take the helmet of salvation and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God. And pray in the Spirit on all occasions with all kinds of prayers and requests.' (Ephesians 6:13-18)

We too can rely on the armour of God to help us in in our own struggles. As we pray, let us equip ourselves with every piece:

- **The Belt of truth**: Pray for wisdom and discernment to see the world through the eyes of Christ, rather than through the distortions of the media.
- The Breastplate of righteousness: Ask the Lord to help you live a godly life, protecting yourself from harmful temptations.
- The Readiness of the gospel of peace: Pray that, with peace in your heart, you will be able to share the good news of Jesus.
- **The Shield of faith**: In times of doubt or fear, pray for your faith to be strengthened, and for courage to trust in God's protection.
