# <u>Letter from Pastor Richard</u> <u>Joys and Sorrows</u>

Of all the months in the year, I always feel that November is the most nostalgic. Summer was special, with hot days and holidays, but autumn glows with superb colour – how delightfully creative of God to celebrate the entrance of winter with a palette of leaves, now ochre, bronze, rust, saffron, crimson, copper! We review memories of commotions, concerts, capers, commiserations, companionship, congratulations – and with the celebration of Christmas clamouring for our attention, we wonder where the year has gone.

Well, now, once the juvenile jollifications of November 5<sup>th</sup> is over, there is a pause in activity and we can take time to observe the advice in Psalm 46 verse 10:

#### **Meet our New Deacon: An Interview with David Breese**

At the June Church Meeting it was unanimously voted to co-opt David Breese and his wife Lorraine onto Upper Trosnant's Leadership Team. Their willingness to serve has been a great answer to prayer, and Dave has kindly agreed to be interviewed for the Newsletter.

# Dave, you were born in Wales, but you have a strong South African accent. Where do you call home?

Wales! Even when I lived in South Africa, I always knew I was coming back – and I always supported Welsh teams. I was born in Llandovery, the other side of the Brecon Beacons, and when I first came to Pontypool I didn't really like it. But once I started to settle comfortably in our flat and got to know people, I liked it more and more.

#### How did you come to know the Lord?

Lorraine has shared that we went through a bad time in our marriage. She gave her life to the Lord but I didn't, even though I noticed a big difference in her. But our children were in Sunday School,I and my daughter came home and said, "I's going to be sheep!" I went to the service, and after the Nativity, a chap called Rob Vincent stood up to speak — he was a lawyer who helped write the new South African constitution. Usually in church I would get irritable, and Lorraine would dig me in the ribs if I started fiddling with the hymnbooks. But after a while I felt Rob was speaking directly to me. He brought me some books and pamphlets including John Blanchard's *Ultimate Questions*, and a section on Romans kept drawing me back. I read it twice then got down on my knees. I didn't tell Lorraine, and she didn't know until the next Sunday, when the minister asked her, 'Did you notice any change in Dave?' That's when I started getting involved in the Church.

At one stage I was planning on taking a correspondence course on the Bible, when I was retrenched by my company three times. So I went to the Baptist College in Cape Town for a 4 year course, and took certificates in pastoral ministry and preaching.

#### Did any special signs lead you to Upper Trosnant?

It started when I looked round Pontypool on Google Streetview, and saw the Christian Bookshop. I moved here ahead of Lorraine and went to find the Bookshop. I walked in and learned that they'd been praying for someone who understood computers; that's when I met Anthea. I had always felt Trowbridge was our final place – until we came here. One morning I was unwell, and Lorraine was late for the church she had intended to go to. So, she visited Upper Trosnant, and came home to tell me she had found her spiritual home. And she was right.

# You are a familiar sight running the computer in Sunday Services. Do you think technology is important for Christians?

It is. You can do more studying, much quicker — although there is a lot of false information online and you do have to be careful. I like to spend a lot of time researching and to really know what I'm talking about. I have been in computers since 1979 — I was working on one of the very first ones in South Africa which took up a whole floor of a city block. My laptop is more powerful now! I fell behind when I retired in 2016/17, but I realised newer computers are just different versions of the old. Everything that I have learned in work I have put towards what I do now. Lots of older people are scared of using computers, and at Trowbridge I would teach them how to do it.

#### What are your hopes and prayers for the Christian Bookshop?

It is all in the Lord's hands. It can't survive from books and selling coffee; it does need donations from churches and people. My vision is that it is not there just to push Bibles on people – it should be a place of listening, somewhere there is shoulder to unburden yourself on. People should leave the bookshop in a better state than when they come in. I believe that the Lord will keep it going.

#### Is there a Bible verse that you always turn to?

Psalm 84 verse 10 says, "Better is one day in your courts than a thousand elsewhere; I would rather be a doorkeeper in the house of my God than dwell in the tents of the wicked." In South Africa I welcomed people on the door for 12 years — it was such a big church we needed continuity to know if somebody was new. I have always had a heart to serve God and help other people and I love being busy.

# Fishing and Fish in the Sea of Galilee

Fishing was a productive industry at the time of Jesus; mostly conducted from small shallow draft boats which could be rowed or propelled by a small sail. Nets were used, either cast from the boat or the shore. Line and rod fishing was not used. The map opposite, prepared by Mendel Nun, shows the harbours around the fresh-water Sea of Galilee mostly used by fishermen.

There were about 10 species of fish out of 18 that were sought by fisherman and these can be divided into 3 groups. The binny, also known as a barbel, grows to 750mm weighing 7kg. The second group is called musht and grows to about 450mm long and a weight of 2kg. The third group is the kenneret sardine. Today the Ministry of Agriculture states there are around 27 species of fish here with the additional species being introduced from elsewhere.



Replica of a shallow draft fishing boat used on the Sea of Galilee at the time Walking by the Sea of Galilee, Jesus saw saw two brothers, Simon called Peter and his brother Andrew. They were casting a net into the lake, for they were fishermen. 'Come, follow me', Jesus said, 'and I will make you fishers of men'. Matthew 4:18-19 & Luke 5:6 So when they followed Jesus's instructions they caught such a large number of fish their nets began to break.



Jesus said, 'You give them something to eat'. They answered, 'We have only five loaves of bread and two fish - unless we go and buy food for all this crowd'. About 5,000 men were there. But Jesus said to his disciples, 'Have them sit down in groups of about 50'. Taking the five loaves an two fish and looking up to heaven, he gave thanks and broke them. Then he gave them to the disciples to set before the people. They all ate and were satisfied . . Luke 9:13-17.

The early Church used the sign of the fish as a sign to mark Christian meeting places and tombs.



The Greek word for fish is 'Ichthys' and symbolises baptism by water immersion, as practiced by the early Church and was a reminder that Christians are "fishers of men".

#### **Focus on Mission: UFM Worldwide**

The visiting speaker for Upper Trosnant's Church Anniversary Sunday in October was Tim Howlett, who is the Head of Partnerships at UFM Worldwide. In the morning service, Tim spoke inspiringly about mission, encouraging us to see ourselves as missionaries in the place where we are, knowing that we are not acting on our own but as part of a team working for the Lord.

Although UFM Worldwide was not previously known to many at Upper Trosnant, its work began in 1931 when a group of missionaries working in Brazil and in the country now called The Democratic Republic of the Congo, joined together to form the Unevangelised Fields Mission, with its headquarters in London. Until 1976 they and their successors worked with agencies in the USA and Canada before the organisation divided into three separate parts, and the UK based branch became known as UFM Worldwide.

UFM Worldwide does not send its own missionaries abroad; rather it partners with churches, helping them to identify, train, send and support workers for cross-cultural mission. Currently they have more than 200 mission partners in 35 countries, sent by 90 gospel-hearted churches. UFM workers are committed to making disciples of all nations, taking the gospel to the least reached, and supporting under-resourced churches around the world.

This sets out its commitment to the Gospel, to Churches, to People and to the Lord. The work is based on the truths of biblical, historic Christianity and the organisation's mandate is the Great Commission of Jesus to "Go and make disciples of all nations, baptising ... and teaching them to obey all I have commanded you." The priority is especially to take the gospel to least reached people in the World and to serve the most under-resourced churches. Underpinning the work is the principle that responsibility for identifying, training, sending and supporting workers for cross-cultural mission rests primarily with the local church, and UFM workers have a strong sense of God's leading which is confirmed by their home church. UFM also partners with many national and international

churches/agencies in areas such as pioneer **e**vangelism, student ministry, church planting and pastoral and leadership training. The aim is to be a family, not simply an organisation, and also to be flexible, with structures established to serve people while they serve the Lord. UFM is happy to enable mission workers to go anywhere in the world, if possible.

UFM also supports the IFES (International Fellowship of Evangelical Students) InterAction programme which offers placements of one to two years in national student movements across Europe or with international student ministry. Many of these are based in traditionally Greek Orthodox countries including Greece and Moldova, or Catholic ones such as Italy and Spain. They work alongside evangelical students in their churches, encouraging them to share their faith with their friends and helping to plan Bible studies and outreach events. Their goal is for every student to have the chance to hear and respond to the gospel.

Another organisation partnered by UFM Worldwide is ACTS – African Christian Textbooks. Across Africa, many African pastors and theology students have very few books, and those that they need can be difficult to obtain and often unaffordable. For 30 years ACTS have been supplying pastors and Bible students with quality textbooks, sourcing them from major publishers all over the world, and helping develop and publish books written by African writers who can relate best to the African context.

Some of the missionary work being done is much closer to home, for example a ministry to Muslim shop workers in the UK, and missionary who was born in Egypt but has lived for over 30 years in London, working among Arabic-speaking people on the streets. He has much experience in sharing the gospel with different Arab cultures from the Middle East and North Africa, and is involved in different types of outreach, including street and open air evangelism, a pavement café and book table ministry, one-to-one discipleship, evangelism training ministry, and preaching and teaching the Bible in the UK and the Middle East.


Let us pray for the work of UFM Worldwide, and let us ask the Lord to give us a heart to reach out to those who do not know the Gospel in our own town of Pontypool.
