Letter from Pastor Richard

He was raised on the third day according to the Scriptures

We are in the season of Easter. It is a time for us to celebrate the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead. He was put to death on a cross, there taking upon himself all of the wrong things we have done. He was taken from the cross, his body put into a tomb, and a big stone put in front of it.

Early on the first day of the week, some women who were friends of Jesus went down to the tomb, because they wanted to put some spices on to his body. But, when they arrived,



they had a very large shock. The stone had been rolled away from the tomb. They wondered what had happened, and so they went inside to investigate. And the body of Jesus was not there. They thought that his body had been stolen. But that is not what had happened.

Jesus was really alive once again, and later on he showed himself to the women, they saw that he had truly risen from the dead. And in the next days and weeks he appeared to many people.

And that is very important to us as Christians. In fact, Paul tells us it is of first importance. In 1 Corinthians 15 v 14 he writes:

If Christ has not been raised, our preaching is useless and so is your faith.

It is as important as that. There are some who would tell us that we don't need to believe in the resurrection. But the Apostle Paul would disagree. Without the resurrection there would be no Christian faith. What then makes the resurrection so important?

Now we could say a number of things about this, but I would just like to mention two.

First of all, the resurrection shows that God is pleased with what Jesus has done for us. In other words, the sacrifice that Jesus made for our sins has been accepted. If Jesus had not been raised there would be no forgiveness of sins:

If Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile, you are still in your sins. 1 Corinthians 15 v 17

Secondly, because Jesus was raised to life, we can also know new life for ever with him. Here are some words written by Peter the Apostle:

Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! In his great mercy he has given us new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead.1 Peter 1 v 3

Now this is not some academic exercise simply to show that Jesus was truly raised. This is a living experience for us as Christians. We can know the presence of the risen Lord Jesus Christ with us as we live our lives in this world as well as the world to come. It is no wonder we enjoy singing these words:

He lives, He lives, Christ Jesus lives today! He walks with me and talks with me along life's narrow way. He lives, He lives, salvation to impart! You ask me how I know He lives? He lives within my heart.

Happy Birthday Isaac Watts (Part Two)

This year marks 350 years since the birth of the great hymn-writer Isaac Watts. In the February newsletter we looked at his upbringing and some of the influences that led him to devote his life to God's service and to use his gift of poetry to adapt Psalms to be sung as hymns in church services. You might be surprised to know that such an active preacher and prolific writer suffered from serious ill-health throughout his life.

Although there is no modern diagnosis of a specific condition that afflicted him, the records of his life indicate that from childhood he experienced regular and incapacitating bouts of illness. As a minister he was rarely able to preach for two consecutive Sundays, needing time to recover from the effort of standing in a pulpit and raising his voice. One account describes how 'his nervous system was in a shattered condition', and he is known to have endured periods of extreme insomnia. There was nothing that the available medical treatments in the early eighteenth century could do to alleviate his symptoms.

Fortunately, Isaac was greatly helped by a number of influential and generous Christian friends, who invited him to stay with them and provided care and support. In about 1712 he was invited by the London banker and merchant Sir Thomas Abney to stay for a week – a visit that was extended for 36 years! Thomas Abney was born in Leicestershire and had come to London as an apprentice fishmonger in 1658, when he was 18. Ten years later he was elected a member of the Fishmongers Guild, rising to be a director of the Bank of England and Lord Mayor in 1700. He was knighted by King William III. Sir Thomas was deeply pious, and his Christian beliefs and devotion to prayer underpinned his business life. Isaac lived with Thomas and his wife Lady Mary Abney in Lime Street in London, also staying at their houses in Theobalds in Hertfordshire, and Abney Park in Stoke Newington. Sir Thomas died in 1722, and from 1733 Lady Abney and her two surviving daughters settled permanently at Abney Park, with Isaac as a much-loved member of their family household. It was a comfortable life, and Isaac was deeply grateful to his hosts. He dedicated his book Divine Songs (1715) to Lady Abney: 'It is to her unwearied tenderness, and many kind offices by night and day, in the more violent seasons of my indisposition, that (under God) I own my life, and power to write or think.

Isaac Watts never married. The nearest he came to it was in proposing marriage to Elizabeth Singer, the daughter of a dissenting minister and a Christian poet in her own right. Elizabeth had first written to Isaac about his poetry, which she found greatly moving, and when they met, he was captivated by her beauty and charming manners. Sadly, however, she was not equally smitten – one description of Isaac mentions his short stature, sallow skin, and hooked nose – and she remarked that, 'while she loved the jewel [his mind] she could not admire the casket!'

Refusing to be crushed by such harsh words, Isaac kept his mind firmly on the Lord, his life a constant witness to his faith and joy in praising God. We regularly sing one of his best-known hymns in Upper Trosnant:

"Come, we that love the Lord, and let our joys be known; join in a song with sweet accord, and thus surround the throne."

In fact, these powerful words were written in response to Christians who felt that while Psalms were appropriate songs in church, new and modern hymns were not, and it was not unknown for people to walk out of services to show their disapproval. Verse two goes on:

"Let those refuse to sing who never knew our God; but children of the heav'nly King may speak their joys abroad."

Many of the original words of Issac's hymns have been adapted to meet the changing needs of churches over the past three centuries. Surely he would have approved! As we sing this one, we use a chorus that was added by the American composer Robert Lowry in the 19th Century. Inspired by the third verse, it looks forward to our future home in heaven:

"The hill of Zion yields a thousand sacred sweets before we reach the heav'nly fields, or walk the golden streets.

We're marching to Zion, Beautiful, beautiful, Zion: We're marching upward to Zion, The beautiful city of God!"

How could Isaac not be full of joy with such a hope in his heart:

"Then let our songs abound, and every tear be dry; we're marching through Emmanuel's ground, to fairer worlds on high."



Abram's journey from Carchemish was now south (Gen 11:31) and from here his caravan travelled among Semites (i.e. Jews and Arabs) The speed of the caravan of carts and camels, depended on the pace of his flock, which would have grazed and bred on the way. The caravan included (Gen 12:4) Abram's wife Sarai, and his nephew Lot. In spring or early summer the caravan, a little under 4,000 years ago, descended into the Bekka valley. Their first important stop was Aleppo, known then as Halap which means iron or copper; Then on to Kadesh. This was a busy city with buildings made of basalt, although few of them are left now, and then it was on again to Damascus.

This was a journey of faith, directed by the Lord, and Damascus (the name means a Sackful of Blood) stood out as a city on the edge of the desert. In Abram's day it was almost 3,000 years old and Abram would have stayed here for some time, possibly wintering near the Barada river. It was centuries later that Paul of Tarsus, in the Straight Street (Darb-al-Mustakin), had his blindness cured. It was on from here towards the hills on the east of Bethel (Gen 12:8) with Ai to the east and then to Shechem (v6) where Abram built an alter to the Lord, who had appeared to him. Then Abram set out towards the Negev. This was the same place, five centuries later, Joshua stood and built another altar from a pile of stones and spoke his final words of commendation to the gathered tribes of Israel. After 15 centuries more, not far from here, Jesus met the woman of Samaria at the well dug by Jacob.

From here there was a change of plan: famine had moved from the east and now threatened Canaan so Abram journeyed on towards Egypt, where the Nile delta provided a rich and well watered land.



Mission Focus - The Work of BMS in Ukraine

On February 24th 2022, 180,000 Russian soldiers crossed the borders of Ukraine with orders to conquer and take over the country. Over the following two years, many Ukrainians have shown heroic courage in their resistance to the Russian invasion, often at great personal cost. Many have turned to the Lord and pray earnestly for His help and deliverance, and there are a great number of testimonies of miracles they have experienced, giving them hope that the Lord is with them and hears their prayers. Despite this, millions of Ukrainians are suffering great hardship, loss and trauma, whether it be losing their homes, being separated from family and loved ones, enduring freezing winters with no electricity or clean water, or living in a foreign nation surrounded by people of a different language and culture.

In the midst of this terrible suffering, BMS World Mission is doing everything possible to support Christians in the Baptist churches of Ukraine and neighbouring Moldova as they offer support according to their means and the needs of those they are helping. Some churches have opened their buildings to offer a warm space, hot meals, hygiene items and a place of comfort and safety for those whose homes and communities have been destroyed by bombing. Others have welcomed refugees who have fled from other parts of the country, providing them with humanitarian aid and an opportunity to attend Bible studies and support groups. Some churches have formed chaplaincy teams that go to the troops wherever they are deployed, as well as to hospitals and rehabilitation centres, whilst other churches are providing temporary or helping people to rebuild their homes and accommodation communities. Many churches are specifically reaching out to the growing number of widows and orphans, offering practical support as well as friendship and comfort to them in their loss, and trying to restore a sense of hope for the future through the love of Jesus.


The BMS is also supporting the work of a Christian refugee assistance centre in the Moldovan capital, Chisinau, which offers not only food and shelter, but also psychological and spiritual support to those who come to their door. They take time to listen to those who need to talk and tell their story, and they offer to pray for comfort and healing of those with broken hearts and troubled minds. The BMS asks us to pray for the

people of Ukraine, especially....

- That the Lord would guide and strengthen the Christians who are selflessly giving their time to minister to the needs of others.
- That those who hear the gospel would become followers of Jesus and that His love would heal every wound.
- That the Lord would bring an end to the war as swiftly as it began, and would bring freedom and prosperity back to the people so that they can rebuild their lives and their country again.

Gift Day

It has never been the custom for Upper Trosnant to hold a Gift Day every year, and the leadership team are well aware of the regular, generous and faithful giving shown by members and friends of the church each week. As a small fellowship we are greatly blessed that we are able to support a Pastor and maintain our church in a good state of repair as well as keep it nice and warm. In recent years it is only when a particular need has arisen, that we have invited individuals to make a special financial gift, as they see fit, and as the Lord guides them.

As you will already be aware, in 2023 we undertook quite major work to eliminate the problem of the damp church wall. A deep trench was dug and filled with gravel, and the inside of the wall was replastered. Now that the winter is over, we will be beginning a second phase of work, treating the damp and damaged plaster of the front wall of the church, and then repainting our whole building. As a leadership team we believe that it is right that we take good care of our church, and that it should look caredfor and welcoming.

All the work completed so far has been paid for, and we thank the Lord that he has blessed us financially so that this could be done. However, the overall cost of both phases will be approximately £15k-20k, and our reserves have been significantly depleted. In order to keep our finances secure therefore, we are inviting all members and friends of Trosnant through a Gift Day, to make donations toward the cost of completing the building work and decorating.

The Gift Day will be held over two <u>Sundays</u>, <u>21 and 28 April</u>. Gifts can be brought to either service or sent by any convenient means. Special envelopes will be available in Church and sent with postal copies of the Newsletter. Please be mindful that we can claim 25% of the value of your gift back from the government, at no additional cost.

"You must each decide in your heart how much to give. And don't give reluctantly in response to pressure. For God loves a person who gives cheerfully. And God will generously provide all you need. Then you will always have everything you need and plenty left over to share with others." (2 Corinthians 9: 7-8.)

Prayer Page: Yes – and Amen!

For no matter how many promises God has made, they are "Yes" in Christ. And so through him the "Amen!" is spoken by us to the glory of God. (2 Corinthians 1: 20)

Do you say, Amen, when you are praying at home? Or is it just a word that you use at the end of the prayers in Church? We say it so often that it is easy to forget the very important meaning of this little but powerful word.

Praising God

In the Old Testament, Amen is used in praising God. For example, 'Then all the people said "Amen!" and "Praise the Lord!" (I Chronicles 16:36). There are many prayers of praise we can affirm with our own Amen.

- Praise God for the seasons, and for new life in Spring.
- Praise God for the salvation that we have through Jesus.
- Praise God for our church at Upper Trosnant, and for our fellowship and Christian friends.
- Praise God for our daily bread food, shelter, rest.

Affirming God's justice

'Amen' is first used in the Bible in the book of Deuteronomy. In Chapter 27 Moses announces penalties for breaking God's laws, and after each line we read, '*Then all the people shall say, "Amen!'''* There are many situations in our world where we can affirm our desire for and trust in God's justice and peace:

- In war zones especially Ukraine, Gaza, Sudan...
- Where there is political unrest or religious persecution Haiti, India, Afghanistan...
- Where we desire to see godly government, change for the good and help for the needy in our own country and local area.

Declaring our confident hope

When we end our petitions and requests with 'Amen' we are expressing our trust in the Lord that he has heard and will answer our prayers.

"The Lord will rescue me from every evil attack and will bring me safely to his heavenly kingdom. To him be glory for ever and ever. Amen." (2 Timothy 4:18)
