Letter from Pastor Richard

Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures

It is the season in the Christian calendar known as Lent. This is the six-week period leading up to Easter. At the end of this month, we will be celebrating Easter Sunday and there are articles that help us to do so in this Newsletter. And I will be bringing some thoughts on that in the next edition.

Here I would like to concentrate on the death of the Lord Jesus Christ. It is one of the fundamentals of our faith. If Jesus had not died, then the Christian faith would have no



basis. Why am I so convinced of that? The title of this piece is a quotation from 1 Corinthians, words written by the Apostle Paul:

For what I received I passed on to you as of first importance: that Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures. Corinthians 15 v 3 (NIV)

Now that which Paul considers of first importance continues after this verse, and we will consider the rest of the quotation next month. In fact, this is part of a really great chapter, which we will be looking at in a short sermon series, starting on Easter Sunday. But coming back to the death of Jesus, the fact that Paul considers Jesus' death of first importance, means that surely we must as well. What was vital to him should be vital to us too.

But there is another reason, which our verse gives us: *Christ died <u>for</u> <u>our sins</u>. When Jesus died, it was not like any other death. He was perfect God come into this world in human form. He was the one person who never did anything wrong. Unlike all of us. We all do things we should not – we know that don't we? And the truth is that these wrong things should be punished. BUT Jesus, when he died, took that punishment upon himself. We no longer need to be punished. And that is something that is very important indeed. What we need to do is to put our trust in what he did, and we will know forgiveness for all of the wrong things we have done.*

I am not making this up, neither was the Apostle Paul because he also says in our verse that Jesus died for our sins "according to the Scriptures." The Bible very clearly teaches us that Jesus died; you can read it for yourselves – just look at the last few chapters of each of the Gospels. And there is one more thing to say about this – Jesus' death only means something because he did not stay dead – he came back to life again. You cannot have his death without his resurrection!

But now, let's trust in the One who died for our sins. I would like to share some words written, originally in Welsh, about 200 years ago by the hymn writer John Elias:

> And was it for my sin That Jesus suffered so, When moved by his all-powerful love He came to earth below?

He suffered pain and death, When on the hill brought low; His blood will wash the guilty clean, As pure and white as snow.

For in his death our death Died with him on the tree, And great the number by his blood Will go to heaven made free. John Elias Translated by Noel Gibbard

Doreen's Page: Hot Cross Buns

A tasty treat for Easter from Doreen's book, A Benediction of Bluebells!

Hot cross buns! Traditionally eaten on Good Friday in Great Britain, Ireland, Australia, Canada and some part of the Americas (according to Wikipedia...). A sweet, spiced bun made with currants and raisins, and marked with a cross on top. Progress has also caught up with bakers – and now toffee, orange and cranberry, apple and cinnamon, coffee, cherry and chocolate and butterscotch flavoured hot cross buns are available all year round!

Hot cross buns originated in the UK, and they marked the end of Lent, when restrictions on certain foods were lifted. A monk, brother Thomas Radcliffe from St Albans, introduced the spicey bun with a cross on top in honour of Good Friday in 1361, and distributed them to the poor on that day. In 1592 Queen Elizabeth I issued a decree forbidding the sale of hot cross buns except on Good Friday or at Christmas! Of course, hot cross buns are now available throughout the year. Legends accrue: it is said that if you hang a hot cross bun from your kitchen roof on Good Friday, it will remain fresh and mould-free for the rest of the year, just as the body of Jesus, who called himself the Bread of Life, had no sign of decay after his crucifixion and prior to his resurrection.

In 2014, an Australian baker had the novel idea of producing a NOT cross bun decorated with a smiling face! A Bible reference for this version would be, "The joy of the Lord is your strength" (Nehemiah 8:10), and an appropriate name could be "The Hallelujah bun."

It is theologically accurate to present Hot cross buns all through the year. Christ is not just for Easter. Good Friday was not an end but a beginning. Jesus rose from the dead as he said he would. He will never break his promise to be with us, always, even to the end of time! So, the classic Easter hymn, "Jesus Christ is risen today, Hallelujah!" is also suitable for every day.

As another old hymn declares, "New every morning is his love, our wakening and uprising prove. From sleep and darkness, safely brought, restored to life, and power, and thought."

<u>A Good Read: Carriers of the Fire –</u> <u>Women of the Welsh Revival, by Karen Lowe</u>

Wales is a country with a great Christian heritage, going right back to the days of its patron saint, David, in the 6th century. One remarkable feature of our heritage is the number of revivals of true faith the nation has experienced. Historians have recorded at least fifteen revivals between 1762 and 1862 alone, but the one that many consider the greatest of all the revivals began 120 years ago this year, in 1904.

The 1904-5 Revival was so powerful and widespread in its effect that over 100,000 people were converted in Wales alone, and more than a million in the rest of the United Kingdom. The revival was not limited to our shores, but spread right across Europe and the world, triggering revivals in Scandinavia and other parts of Europe, as well as in North America, India, Africa and Latin America.

Evan Roberts of Loughor, near Swansea, was the pioneer of the 1904-5 Revival and he became a household name throughout Wales. In many homes, his picture hung on the parlour wall. Others served alongside him whose names are not so well known, but the most extraordinary story of the Revival is one that is almost untold – the story of ordinary women raised up and empowered by the Lord to became radical evangelists, teenage revivalists, and inspired worship leaders whom God used to touch and transform the heart of the nation. It is this thrilling aspect of the 1904-5 Revival that is recorded and described in fascinating detail in Karen Lowe's book **"Carriers of the Fire - The Women of the Welsh Revival 1904/5."**

Karen begins her account with the lives of five remarkable women who were the forerunners of the 1904-5 Revival....women like **Mary David**, an uneducated, elderly lady from Loughor, near Swansea, who started a Sunday school in her home, early in the 1800s, to teach the local children about Jesus. Her ministry was so successful that a special meeting place soon had to be built to house all the children who came, and this meeting house went on to become Moriah Chapel. It was in that very same chapel that the 1904 Revival broke out, with Evan Roberts and the seventeen young people who were meeting there, including a little girl. Karen goes on to tell the astonishing story of **Pamela Shepherd** who was born in Talywain in 1836. At 42 years of age, she was sent by the Salvation Army to start a work in the valleys town of Aberdare, her only 'helpers' being her three daughters, aged 16, 14 and 4! At their first open-air meeting on a Saturday night, she and the girls had a rough reception but, undaunted and full of courage, Pamela rebuked the men for their attitude, and told them to come to the Temperance Hall the following evening to hear the message of salvation. Amazingly they came, and the hall was packed. Pamela preached, and she and the girls sang, with great effect on the crowds, but then a most dramatic confrontation took place between some hostile hecklers in the hall, and Pamela, as she led the meeting. The whole account is so thrilling it must be read to be fully appreciated, and the core, and many were converted as a result.

These and other stories are just 'tasters' of the many equally dramatic and exciting stories that follow, when the 1904/5 Revival actually began! From chapter three onwards, we read of the women who helped to fire the starting gun of the Revival, including **Florrie Evans** of Newquay, Ceredigion. When Florrie's minister asked the young people in his church to share what Jesus Christ meant to them, 15-year-old Florrie simply replied, "I love the Lord Jesus with all my heart." This simple testimony had a dramatic effect, and the others present seemed to be overwhelmed by an unaccountable power that didn't fade away! In the days following, the minister was able to send teams of his young people out into Newquay and neighbouring villages to spread the 'fire', and the Newquay girls were instrumental in bringing Sidney Evans and Evan Roberts - both key leaders in the Revival - to a life-changing encounter with God.

By chapter four, the Revival has taken off, and we read of teams of young women travelling with Evan Roberts and others as their coworkers, and as singing evangelists. These girls played an absolutely crucial part in breaking through the barrier of hard hearts and stubborn wills, bringing many to a place of true faith and release from sin. The Revival soon became known for the outpouring of singing that was heard in homes, on the streets and down the mines, with the hymn "Here is Love, Vast as the Ocean" especially capturing the heart of the nation. Chapter six describes many examples of the powerful prayers of women of all ages, and the effect it had on others. At a meeting in Rhos, a 12-year-old girl prayed with such simplicity yet power that "*strong men cried, and many a cheek was wet with tears*". For those present, this was one of the most striking prayers they had ever heard and was what affected them most deeply. Later chapters describe teams of ladies going out together, released for the task and encouraged by Evan Roberts and the other male leaders. In some meetings, teenage girls took the lead, like Annie May Rees who was only 15 years old when she took Cardiff by storm, with the result being that "*families were reconciled, prostitutes converted, the destitute melted by the love of Jesus.*"

Many more remarkable stories of the courage and boldness of these girls in spreading the gospel are described. They preached not only in meetings, but also in the open-air, gypsy camps and lodging houses, and wherever they went the impact on the locality was extraordinary. Debts were paid, drunkards became sober, magistrates courts had no cases to hear, people worshipped instead of blaspheming, families were reunited, miners held prayer meetings underground, and entire communities were touched and renewed. What a profound an effect the witness and ministry of these women had in spreading the Revival far and wide.

Sadly, by February 1905, voices criticising the Revival began to be heard, and false rumours were being circulated. Nevertheless, the Revival fire continued to spread over the border into England, up to Scotland and into Ireland. People travelled from other nations to Wales to witness the move of God's Spirit for themselves, and took the 'fire' back with them. The Revival spread far and wide, with great effect in India, Madagascar, Japan, the USA and Patagonia. Rees Howells (the famous intercessor) and his wife, Elizabeth, had both been profoundly impacted by the Revival, and when they travelled to South Africa as missionaries, within weeks they experienced revival breaking out there.

Evan Roberts had foreseen that the Revival would become "A great sun shining upon the whole world," and not only was this fulfilled, but the role played by women in bringing it about is both uplifting and challenging, and is wonderfully described in this most inspiring book.





75 Years Young – Happy Birthday to Sisterhood!

This month the Upper Trosnant Ladies Sisterhood will be celebrating 75 years since their Tuesday afternoon meeting first began, with an Anniversary Service in Church on Sunday 10th March, and a party in the Hall, on Tuesday 12th. We hope a great many friends old and new will come to the service to thank God for the Sisterhood, which has been a beacon of prayer, fellowship and service to the Lord over so many years. All ladies are also warmly invited to the party – but **please let Annmarie know if you are coming** so we can make sure there's enough tea and cake for everyone!

The Sisterhood first met in 1949 and their first president was Mrs Bertha Jenkins, whose daughter Thelma Rogers was to follow her as a member of the Sisterhood for many years, also serving as president in the early 2000s. Another founding member and long-standing president was Mrs Dorothy Gist, who was baptised at Upper Trosnant in 1945 and who served the church as a deacon and organist for over 40 years. Mrs Gist was renowned for her skill with the needle, and raised hundreds of pounds for the church funds through making peg bags and crocheted items. This creative tradition continues today, with some talented knitters among the Sisterhood membership who produce a great many hats and mittens, puppets and bags to go into the Christmas Shoebox gifts every year. Mrs Gist was succeeded in her musical role by Ron Saunders, and as Sisterhood president by Ron's wife Jen, who led the meeting with great love and kindness to everyone for many years. Another former president was Mrs Lily Wildy, who was succeeded by Thelma and then by Helen Norman.

As the years have passed, meeting times and routines (and favourite cakes!) of the Sisterhood may have changed - but the core activities have not. Good fellowship and prayer have always been an essential part of every meeting, as is the study of God's word, singing his praises together, and having a good old natter among Christian friends. The Sisterhood also take a voluntary collection every week, and has always been generous supporters of the Church and of numerous charities.

Mission Focus: The BMS in India

Did you know that following the foundation of the Baptist Missionary Society in 1792, the first country where its missionaries travelled to preach the Gospel was India? At that date there were many trading links between India and Britain. One man, a cobbler from Moulton in Northamptonshire called William Carey, was inspired by his deep study of the Bible to believe that Jesus's words to 'Go into all the world and preach the gospel to all creation' were for all time. His conviction led to the foundation of the BMS and, one year later, opened the way for him to travel with another missionary and their families to Calcutta (Kolkata). The work was hard. They had to work to support themselves, learn new languages, adjust to a different climate and overcome many immense challenges. In 41 years, Carey saw just 700 converts; his first wife suffered a complete breakdown; and three of his 5 sons died before him. However, he also left a legacy of Bible translations, education, and social reform, and today there are nearly 28 million Christians in India, of whom 13% identify as Baptists.

That sounds like a strong and mighty Church – until we remember that the total population of India is some 1.4 billion people, of whom all the Christians together comprise just 2.3%. Christian communities face persecution, and it can be illegal to convert to a different faith. Nonetheless, BMS World Mission still supports a worker in India, and we can be encouraged by his story of faith, and his experience of seeing God at work in some marvellous ways. Benjamin Francis is a Mission Team Leader overseeing BMS work in Kolkata and beyond. His work focuses on providing practical support for the most marginalised people and on taking the gospel to the least evangelised through discipleship making movements. He also partners Big Life Ministries in West Bengal, whose vision is to reach people for Jesus through planting new churches. To facilitate his work Benjamin uses the BMS boat, Peace 3, which visits the islands around West Bengal. In his most recent update, Benjamin wrote of the phenomenal response of thousands of people responding in faith to the Christmas message and Jesus film, and shared that hundreds of new groups are starting in people's homes.
